EIGHTH HISTORY DAY EVENT TO BE HELD AT THE STATE CAPITOL

West Virginia History Day, authorized by the Legislature and the West Virginia Archives and History Commission, celebrates local groups' efforts to preserve, protect and promote the study of the Mountain State's past. The day-long event will take place on January 29, 2004, in the Cultural

Center and the State Capitol in Charleston, during the regular session of the West Virginia Legislature. Historians, genealogists, educators, preservationists, veterans, fraternal organizations, librarians, ethnic groups, family associations and others with an interest in West Virginia's history are invited to participate. Attractions in the halls of the Capitol will include historical exhibits, reenactments of events in the state's history, music and storytelling.

In addition, a ceremony will be held at the Cultural Center to honor "History Heroes"—citizens from across the state who have made grassroots contributions to the preservation of local, regional or state history. WEST VIRGINIA STATE MUSEUM TO CLOSE JANUARY 16, 2004 FOR RENOVATIONS

The West Virginia State Museum in the Cultural Center on the State Capitol Complex will close Friday, January 16, 2004, for renovations. Over the next several months, the displays in the 27-year-old museum will be dismantled and new exhibits will be installed. When it reopens, the newly renovated 23,000-square foot museum will incorporate the state's regional diversity and ethnic heritage into a variety of entertaining, hands-on displays that cover a wide span of the state's history from early settlement to today. According to state officials, more than 125,000 people visit the West Virginia State Museum each year, and that number is expected to increase dramatically when the new museum opens.

"This will be an attraction that will appeal to visitors of all ages and interests," said Nancy P. Herholdt, Commissioner of the West Virginia Division of Culture and History, which operates the museum. "We have designed an experience that will allow visitors to explore what it means to be a West Virginian by immersing themselves in stories about our land, people and culture. We are extremely excited to have arrived at this point in the project and look forward to being able to share the new museum with our visitors."

On a related note, the Museum in the Park, Chief Logan State Park, Logan, will close January 5 through February 4, 2004, for installation of exhibits. The Museum in the Park will resume normal operations on February 5.

CONFEDERATE VETERAN VOLUME XXXI 1923

Volume XXXI, 1923, of *Confederate Veteran* magazine is now available. We have purchased a replacement volume for the one missing from the set donated to the Archives and History Library some time ago. The magazine, published from 1893 through 1932, was devoted to reminiscences,

poetry, biographical sketches, obituaries of veterans, personal accounts of battles and other war time experiences, as well as reports from various reunion and lineage organizations active in the years covered. The 40 volumes of bound reprints of this valuable historical and genealogical source, along with a cumulative index, are shelved in the Reading Room with our Civil War titles.

WEST VIRGINIA'S CEMETERIES 2004 SHPO CALENDAR

The State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO), West Virginia Division of Culture and History, produces an attractive calendar each year featuring a subject of historical preservation interest. The 2004 topic is cemeteries.
