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## From the Editor:

Beginning in 1869, three successive historical societies were formed with the intent of recording the history of West Virginia and preserving the associated artifacts and documents of its formation. Although their efforts were laudable, none were able to sustain the task. "This, these organizations could not do, for only the strong arm of the State can accomplish that work; but they rendered an excellent service by arousing and keeping awake an interest in historical research and investigation on the part of the people." [Virgil A. Lewis, First Biennial Report of the Department of Archives and History, 1906.] On February 18, 1905, an act providing for the establishment of a State Bureau of Archives and History and for the appointment of a state historian and archivist was passed by the Legislature and on February 21, 1905, was approved by Governor Albert Blakeslee White. # 2005 History Day at the West Virginia Legislature

Local groups with an interest in history or genealogy will be participating in the ninth West Virginia History Day on Thursday, March 17, 2005, at the State Capitol Complex during the first regular session of the 77th West Virginia Legislature. Local historical groups in attendance will be providing displays and conducting reenactments in the Rotunda of the state Capitol. Historians, genealogists, educators, preservationists, veterans, fraternal organizations, librarians, ethnic groups and families with an interest in West Virginia's history will provide exhibits featuring historical documents, photographs, artifacts and publications. Other attractions will include reenactments of events in the state's history, music, storytelling, and a "History Hero" ceremony honoring citizens from across the state who have made recognized contributions to the history of West Virginia.

Authorized by the legislature, West Virginia History Day commemorates local groups' efforts to preserve, protect and promote the study of the Mountain State's past. The West Virginia Division of Culture and History joins the Archives and History Commission, West Virginia Historical Society, West Virginia Historical Association, Preservation

Alliance of West Virginia, Inc., West Virginia Association of Museums, West Virginia Humanities Council, and the Mining Your History Foundation as sponsors of this year's events. All West Virginia History Day events are free and open to the public.

## Terry Lowry to Speak About West Virginia Adjutant General Papers, 1861-1865

Terry Lowry, well-known Civil War historian, author and West Virginia Archives and History staff member, will speak in The State Theater of The Cultural Center on March 16 at 7:00 p.m. The topic will be the West Virginia Adjutant General Papers, 1861-1865. These Civil War-era papers of the state Adjutant General in the collection of the West Virginia State Archives, which make up one of the largest and most significant collections of Civil War documents in the state and possibly in the country, consist of over 19,800 pieces of correspondence, muster rolls, order books and miscellaneous records of the West Virginia regiments and the West Virginia Union militia. Although largely Union in origin, the collection contains a few scattered Confederate documents. One can also find letters from Clara Barton, General Joseph A. J. Lightburn, John Muir, Waitman T. Willey, Kellian V. Whaley, Nathan Goff, and others. (West Virginia Archives and History News will provide more information on these and other Civil War documents in a future issue.)

Hoot Owl night offers participants an opportunity to meet and talk with other West Virginia researchers, many of whom live out-of-state or who live in-state but seldom travel to Charleston. A prize will be given to the person travelling the farthest. American Civil War Maps (1861-1865) features maps from three outstanding collections: the Library of Congress Geography and Map Division, the Virginia Historical Society and the Library of Virginia. The entire courthouse was evacuated as Charleston firefighters responded to the call, but some patrons
