### From the Editor:

The summer travel season is in full swing, and many of you will be fitting us in as you drive through Charleston on the way to your final destinations. In order to make best use of your time, we urge you to come prepared with specific records in mind to search, and your questions for our staff written down. Don't forget to bring at least your basic family history information with you for reference, or if you like, post your family tree to one of the available genealogy Web sites for online access as needed. Feel free to call us before you come to verify the availability of the records and other resources you need. With today's fuel prices, keep in mind that for most researchers we can provide "one-stop shopping" for county courthouse records on microfilm, local history books, Ancestry Library Edition, HeritageQuest Online, and both historical and current newspapers for all 55 counties.



### For the Sake of Accuracy

We hate to nitpick, but for the sake of accuracy, especially for ensuring your visits, mail and telephone calls result in contact with the correct agency in a timely fashion, we would like to make the following distinctions.

The Cultural Center is a building on the Capitol Complex. The building houses two agencies and several facilities: West Virginia Division of Culture and History (WVDCH) offices and the West Virginia Archives and History Library; West Virginia Library Commission (WVLC) offices and the WVLC library; the Great Hall; the Norman L. Fagan State Theater; several gallery spaces; various meeting rooms; and space for the State Museum. The "Culture Center" is a name sometimes used for The Cultural Center, probably dating from the earliest days of the building when statutorily it was called the "West Virginia Science and Culture Center," but this is no longer the name used to identify the building. All signs, publications,

stationery and Web pages refer to the building as The Cultural Center.

The **Capitol Complex** is the group of buildings and monuments on the large block of land surrounding

the State Capitol building. The street address of **1900 Kanawha Boulevard East** is used for the entire complex, provides no physical

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# West Virginia Cemetery Listings File is Growing

West Virginia Cemetery Listings, Ms2006-052, the Archives and History Library's artificial collection of cemetery surveys, is already growing. We originally had no listings for Hardy County, and now we have 22, with more expected, thanks to Suzanne W. Whitson of Wardensville, who has been e-mailing cemetery Susan Scouras to susan.scouras@wvculture.org for addition to the collection. If you have information you are willing to share with fellow researchers, please e-mail or mail your lists to us. Handwritten lists are fine and annotations are welcome. Please do not send photocopied pages from published cemetery books, only original surveys. (They may duplicate a list published

in a book, done by a different compiler at a different time, but may not be copied from a book.) We hope to receive location and burial information for cemeteries not included in any of the published cemetery books. Especially sought are listings for the many small family cemeteries on private property scattered across the state, mostly in very rural areas, even if there is only a single marked or known grave to record. 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access to the buildings on the Complex, and when used alone is not an adequate address for any single building or agency. Mail should be addressed to the specific agency with the building name and/or number, and the "zip plus four" zip code. For instance, the mailing address for any agency in The Cultural Center should include the name of the agency, the building name (or its number, Building 9), as well as the full zip code of 25305-0300 with the last four digits indicating the specific building. Mailing addresses should always contain an agency name, not just the name of a person, to avoid delays in delivery. Physical access to the parking areas adjacent to The Cultural Center is by the entrance off Greenbrier Street at Washington Street. The nearest access from I-64/ I-77 is Exit 99. Greenbrier Street.

The West Virginia Division of Culture and History is divided into five sections. The Archives and History section includes the Archives and History Library (located on the north side of the building off the Great Hall), all of the collections and services associated with the **State Archives**, and a staff that includes archivists, historians, a librarian, library assistants, and an archival photographer. Archives and History also provides staff support for the Records Management and Preservation Board (RMPB), primarily by the county records archivist and the Director of Archives and History, and manages the West Virginia Highway Historical Marker Program. **Mining Your History Foundation** is an independent non-profit group that donates funds, materials and volunteer hours to Archives and History.

The other section most used by those interested in history and preservation is the **West Virginia State** 

**Historic Preservation Office** (SHPO). SHPO is responsible for nominations to the State Register of Historic Places and the National Register of Historic Places, as well as administration of several grant programs. SHPO is responsible for preservation of the built environment and archaeology, with staff that includes structural historians and archaeologists. The State Historic Preservation Office is *not responsible* for preservation of, or for providing information regarding preservation of, non-structural items on film or paper, such as manuscripts, books, photographs, videotape, etc., all of which are the responsibility of the

The remaining Culture and History sections are Administration (including Goldenseal magazine, Fairs and Festivals, Events, Technical Services and Security), Arts, and Museums (the State Museum, five historic sites located around the state, and tour guides). The West Virginia Archives and

Archives and History section.

History Commission and the West Virginia Commission on the Arts are citizen advisory boards to WVDCH with members appointed by the governor. Among the responsibilities of the Archives and History Commission are review and approval of nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, and review and approval of applications for Highway Historical Markers. Note that the Cultural Facilities and Capital Resources Grant Program, administered by the Arts section and approved by the Commission on the Arts, is not purely related to the fine arts and is available to historical museums and other cultural sites that fit certain parameters. The Commissioner of WVDCH is the statutory chairman of the RMPB and of the Capitol Building Commission. The Friends of Culture and History is a volunteer group in support of all of WVDCH, providing docents, ushers and other assistance with programs and activities.

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## West Virginia Encyclopedia to be Released on West Virginia Day

The West Virginia Humanities Council has announced the impending release of the new *West Virginia Encyclopedia*, a 944-page, hardbound book with 417 black and white illustrations, on West Virginia Day, June 20, 2006. Special premiere events will be conducted at West Virginia Independence Hall in Wheeling in the morning, at Tamarack in Beckley all day and into

the evening, and at The Cultural Center in Charleston in the evening.

The West Virginia Encyclopedia,

edited by Ken Sullivan, includes 2,200 articles by nearly 600 writers, experts in fields ranging from archaeology, biography, history and literature through folklore, culture, and the arts and sciences. The West Virginia Encyclopedia will be available in bookstores, including Tamarack, or directly from the West Virginia Humanities Council, 1310 Kanawha Blvd. East, Charleston, WV 25301. 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The West Virginia Library **Commission** (WVLC) occupies offices on the south side of The Cultural Center, and serves as the "state library" of West Virginia, providing assistance to public and school libraries throughout the state with a staff of librarians and media specialists. The WVLC Library (located on the south side of the building off the Great Hall) is open to the public 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, and is closed all state holidays. The WVLC Library has state government agencies and employees, the Legislature and legislators' staff, and the general public as their clientele. They issue library cards, have a circulating collection of books and various audio-visual media, and maintain a collection of the study books needed for state employment examinations. The WVLC Library routinely forwards all requests regarding history and genealogy to the Archives and History staff for reply.

[IMPORTANT NOTE: Although the WVLC Library and the WVDCH Archives and History Library are both under the Department of Education and the Arts and share an online public access library catalog, the two libraries are completely separate in mission, funding, staff, administration and physical operation. There is minimal overlap in the collections, patrons and services of the two agencies.]

Additionally, activities, services or publications of three other West Virginia organizations are frequently confused with functions of WVDCH. Unlike a number of well-known state historical societies, the West Virginia Historical Society does not have an office, staff, or library, and does not provide any research services. All research inquiries addressed to the Society are forwarded to the Archives and History Library staff

for reply, and most are returned to the senders with notice of the required research fee. The **West Virginia Humanities Council**, a not-for-profit agency, is West Virginia's state affiliate for the National Endowment for the Humanities, an independent grant-making agency of the federal government. The Humanities Council conducts grant programs and sponsors speakers, re-enactors, and

various other history and social studies-related activities in West Virginia. The Clay Center for the Arts and Sciences, operated by a not-for-profit non-governmental organization, opened in downtown Charleston in 2003 and includes the Avampato Discovery Museum, Maier Foundation Performance Hall, a café and a gift shop.

### **SSDI Search Tips**

The May 17, 2006, issue of *RootsWeb Review* (Vol. 9, No. 20) offers several search tips for the Social Security Death Index (SSDI) (http://ssdi.genealogy.rootsweb.com/cgibin/ssdi.cgi) in an article entitled "Using RootsWeb: Delving Deeper into the SSDI." The following is a combination of statements from the article and of the editor's own experiences with the SSDI.

According to the *RootsWeb* article, the Social Security Administration has limits on the number of letters in the database, twelve letters

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for surnames and nine letters for given names. For example, the surname Alexandropoulos is recorded as "Alexandropou" and the full surname will not be found in an exact search and will not show in full in the search results in any circumstance. However, I have found that

given names up to ten letters are searchable, and will appear in full in the search results. I experimented with Haralambos, Theodorina, Marguerite, and Wilhelmina, all names of ten letters, and found results for all of them. I had a hard time thinking of names with eleven letters or more, but tried variations

of these same names with eleven letters, such as Marguerrite, Charalambos, and Willhelmina, and got no results unless I entered them without the eleventh letter. The eleven letter names appeared in the search results with the name truncated, even if there was an accompanying middle initial. For example, Charalambos T. Alexandropoulos would be in the database as "Charalambo T. Alexandropou," and would be found in an exact search only if the first ten letters of the given name and the first twelve letters of the surname were entered in the search boxes. When all of the letters are entered for one or both names. an exact search will have no result, and although Soundex or Metaphone searches will find the names with more than the limit of letters, in most cases there will be so many results as to be impractical unless searched in combination with a less common surname.

Social Security records were not digitized until 1962, so deaths prior to 1962 are generally not found in the SSDI database; however, you can contact the Social Security Administration directly with an inquiry: http:/ /www.ssa.gov/foia/htm1/ foia guide.htm. Non-U.S. citizens who worked in the United States legally and had Social Security numbers may be listed in the SSDI. Certain occupations were not covered by Social Security until the 1960's or later, primarily people considered self-employed, such as farmers, or unemployed, such as housewives. Physicians were not included until 1965. Many railroad workers who were covered under the Railroad Retirement Act of 1936 had their benefits administered by the Railroad Retirement Board, and had a different series of Social Security numbers. Some received Social Security benefits and some did not.
