Historic Preservation Survey and Planning Grants Available

Applications are now being accepted for historic preservation survey and planning grants through the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) of the West Virginia Division of Culture and History. Approximately \$80,000 is earmarked for this grant program, which is funded with money appropriated by the U.S. Congress through the National Park Service Historic Preservation Fund. State or local government agencies, not-forprofit organizations, for-profit firms or organizations, and educational institutions are eligible to apply. Eligible projects include architectural and archaeological surveys, preparation of nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, heritage education programs relating to preservation activities, predevelopment activities, and comprehensive planning documents and development projects. Funded projects must be completed by June 30, 2006.

Grant funds are awarded on a matching basis. A competitive process is used to determine the recipients with the final decision being made by the West Virginia Archives and History Commission. The Commission selects projects that

best meet the established priorities and criteria. Development projects will be considered only when all of the justifiable funding needs of eligible projects in other categories

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Downtown Revitalization Institute Offering Training Opportunities

The Downtown Revitalization Institute, a partnership effort of Main Street West Virginia and Coalfield Community Development, is offering training opportunities for economic development of downtown communities in West Virginia. History Day March 17, 2005

All organizations interested in history and genealogy are urged to begin preparations now for participation in History Day at the West Virginia Legislature next March 17. Since the West Virginia State Archives will be celebrating its centennial in 2005, we hope to have an extra special celebration of West Virginia's history, plus a strong demonstration of the importance of not only collecting and preserving the physical items containing that history, but of making those resources available to the public.



Samuels-Pierpont Collection

The Archives and History Library houses many letters and documents with historical significance. The collection of the combined papers of Governor Francis H. Pierpont and of Adjutant General Henry J. Samuels of the Restored Government of Virginia, the precursor to the state of West Virginia, contains over 1,400 letters and other documents relating to both civilian concerns and military matters. The papers, the majority of which are dated in 1862, are arranged in alphabetical order by the name of the writer or petitioner, with a printed finding aid. Now the collection can be searched on-line through the West Virginia Memory Project database at http://wvmemory.wvculture.org/ index.htm. A search can be conducted according to these categories: Words Anywhere, Written By, Written To, Date, and Location (town or county). For example, a search for "David Hunter Strother" found several documents, including: Written By Strother, David H., Written To Pierpont, Date of 1862/05/07, and Subject listed as "seeks commission from native state, recommended by W. T. Willey." Although the actual documents are not accessible on-line. a researcher can locate documents relevant to specific people and places. then request to view those papers upon visiting the Archives or request copies through a research letter.
