Time to Think About History Day 2010

It is never too early for your organization to begin thinking about your display table at the annual History Day at the Legislature, scheduled for February 18, 2010. If you will have an event or a new publication to promote in 2010, consider revamping your old display to reflect that. If you have never used display boards, artifacts, costumes, or other attractions in your space, challenge your members to develop some creative means to draw folks over to your table where you can talk to them about the importance of your organization. Set aside some funds for a few give-aways or to aid members in making the trip. If your group has never been represented at History Day, make this your first annual visit.

2010 Speakers for Archives Lecture Series

Two more speakers have been lined up for the First Tuesday Archives and History Workshop and Lecture series. On January 5, 2010, Scott Johnson, a regular Archives and History Library patron who is an Assistant Attorney General with the State of West Virginia, will speak about Genealogy and the Law: An Introduction to Some Legal Issues in Genealogical Research. Johnson told us his presentation "will cover basic use of the West Virginia and Federal Freedom of Information Acts and Privacy Acts, concerns about copyright laws, and issues relating to personal liability (civil and criminal) for field research such as visiting cemeteries." His strong interest in genealogy is expressed by his membership in a number of lineage societies, including the Sons and Daughters of the Colonial and Antebellum Bench and Bar.

In February Doug Wood, alias Ostenaco, returns to the Archives lectern with another topic based on his own extensive research in the books and specialized collections of the Archives and History Library. His lecture on February 2 is entitled "Digging into West Virginia's 18th Century, Groundhog Style." Wood is a long-time Library patron, having spent two decades gathering

historical information for his living history portrayal of Ostenaco, a Cherokee leader. He was very active last year in presentations commemorating the 250th anniversary of the French and Indian War. Darby's Universal Gazetteer

The full title of this reference book by William Darby is Darby's Universal Gazetteer, or, A New Geographical Dictionary: containing a description of the empires, kingdoms, states, provinces, cities, towns, forts, seas, harbours, rivers, lakes, mountains, capes, &c. in the Known World: with the Government, Customs. and Manners, of the inhabitants; the extent, boundaries, and natural productions of each country; and the trade, manufactures, and curiosities of the cities and towns. The West Virginia Archives' copy is "The second edition, with ample additions and improvements," published in Philadelphia by Bennett & Walton in 1827. We continue our series of sample entries for features now in West Virginia, with spelling and punctuation unchanged:

Recipe for Colonial Cologne

The Archives' collections are always full of surprises. Jaime Simmons found the following formula for "Colonial Cologne" written on a slip of paper dated 1905, but with no other identifying information, while browsing the McCulloch Collection.

1/2 oz. oil of Lavender
1/2 oz. oil of Bergamot
1/2 oz. oil of Lemon
16 drops oil of Cinnamon
4 drops oil of Neroli [distillation of fresh blossoms of the bitter orange tree, also called Oil of Orange Flowers]
4 pts. alcohol

Dissolve all in the alcohol and let stand for a few days to filter. Add 10 drops of Attar of Roses.

Moorfields, pst. and seat of justice, Hardy cty. Virg., on the right bank of the S. branch of Potomac 53 ms. SW. by W. from Winchester. Lat. 39° lon. W. C. 1° 56' W.

Kanawha Court House is not in the gazetteer, nor does the entry for Charlestown mention any type of postal service, nor any status as "seat of justice." Although the main entry for the town is "Charlestown," note that it is spelled "Charleston" in the entry for Elk River.

SHPO Survey and Planning Grants Available

Applications are now being accepted for historic preservation survey and planning grants through the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). Approximately \$80,000 is earmarked for this grant program. State or local government agencies, not-for-profit organizations, for-profit organizations or firms, and educational institutions are eligible

to apply. Eligible projects include architectural and archaeological surveys, preparation of nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, heritage education programs relating to preservation activities, pre-development activities, and comprehensive planning documents and development projects. Funded projects must be completed by June

30, 2011. Grant funds are awarded on a matching basis. A competitive process is used to determine the recipients with the final decision being made by the West Virginia Archives and History Commission. The deadline for applications is October 31, 2009. The announcement of grantees is planned for February 2010, contingent upon receipt of an allocation by the National Park Service.
