It's never too early to start preparations for History Day at the Legislature. Be sure to get your table registration and History Hero nomination in on time. For your History Day display in the Capitol, choose something eyecatching that will bring visitors to your table where you can talk to them about your organization. If your society sponsors an event, be sure you have complete information for those who consider attending, since they will be more likely to participate if you can tell them what, why, where, and when while you have their attention. Contact the delegates and senators from the districts your organization covers and invite them to come by your table, or make appointments to visit with them and tell them about your organization's contribution to historical preservation and education.

Terry Lowry to Present "Researching Military History" on November 9

The First Tuesday evening lecture in the Archives and History Library will move temporarily to the second Tuesday of the month in November due to Election Day on November 2. On November 9, 2010, in recognition of Veterans Day, historian Terry Lowry will speak about "Researching Military History." Lowry will discuss researching military records in all periods of United States history but will give greater attention to the Civil War and World War II. He also will cover the methods he used in researching his books. Attendees will have the opportunity to view military artifacts from Lowry's personal collection that he rarely displays in public. He owns items dating from the Civil War to Vietnam, in particular from the Civil War and World War II periods. Lowry will discuss how artifacts can be used in research.

A historian at West Virginia Archives and History, Terry Lowry is a well known military author. His Civil War titles include: *The* Battle of Scary Creek (1982, rev. ed. 1998), September Blood: The Battle of Carnifex Ferry (1985), Twenty-second Virginia Infantry (1988), Twentysixth Battalion Virginia Infantry (1991), Last Sleep: The Battle of Droop Mountain, November 6, 1863 (1996), and (co-author) Images of the Civil War in West Virginia (2000). In his most recent publication, Lowry researched his father's World War II unit to produce Bastard Battalion: A History of the 83rd Chemical Mortar Battalion in World War II (2009). Lowry is the official historian for the 83rd Chemical Mortar Battalion. He is also the author of numerous magazine and newspaper articles.

All Archives and History workshop and lecture sessions are free and the public is invited to attend. On November 9, the library will close at 5 p.m. and reopen at 5:45 p.m. for participants only. Thanksgiving is Good Time to Interview Your Relatives

Thanksgiving is a good time to interview your relatives regarding family history. People usually think of their families around the holidays, remembering both good times and not so good times and sharing their stories with other family members. Even if you won't be seeing them in person, you'll probably be exchanging phone calls or e-mails expressing holiday wishes, and you can use that contact to start a conversation using your own recollections of the family. Your recounting of an event or comment on a relative's personality will give you an opportunity to ask questions and perhaps learn something new that will fill in blanks or open a new research path for you. Family gatherings are also a good time to collect information on life events that have occurred since your last contact: births, marriages, divorces and deaths, as well as military service and new postal and e-mail addresses. If you have a scanner, invite family members to bring photographs and documents to share. Make photocopies of photographs you already have and ask for help in identifying people,

places, time period, etc., allowing people to write directly on the copies. Remind those who are reluctant to participate that knowing your family history can be very important for medical history reasons these days. Most of all, do what you can to make your ancestors come alive for the younger generation by talking about the important historical events they would have experienced, or their way of life during war years, the depression, the economic boom of the 1920's or their involvement in a particular industry in your area, such as automotive plants, coal mines, oil wells, timbering, farming, etc. Hopefully you will awaken an interest in history and genealogy in a youngster to whom you may someday pass the torch as the family historian.

SSDI Improved

The popular Social Security Death Index (SSDI) database has recently improved its search capabilities to allow advanced searches on any or all fields in the database, according to an article in RootsWeb Review.
