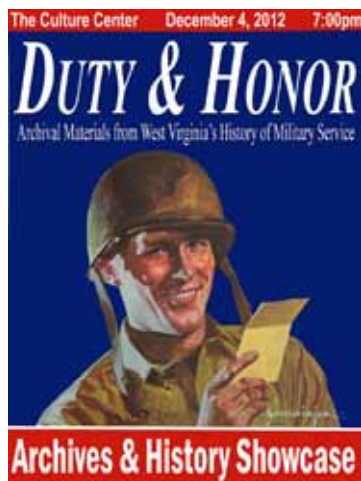
Archives and History Annual Showcase

Time to Prepare for History Day 2013

Come celebrate the Seventeenth Annual West Virginia History Day on Thursday, February 21, 2013. The event will be held at the West Virginia State Capitol Complex during the 1st session of the 81st West Virginia Legislature. West Virginia History Day is officially designated by the West Virginia Archives and History Commission as a special day to recognize the

state's rich and varied history. Other co-sponsors of the event are Friends of Culture and History, Mining Your History Foundation, Preservation Alliance of West Virginia, Inc., West Virginia Association of Museums, West Virginia Historical Society, West Virginia Humanities Council, and West Virginia Division of Culture and History.

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Please make note of these important History Day activity dates:

McBrides Presented Entertaining and Informative Talk on Frontier Forts

Drs. Kim and Stephen McBride gave a talk entitled "Frontier Forts" on Thursday, October 25, 2012, one of two lectures hosted by Archives and History in recognition of October as Archaeology Month. They were enthusiastically received by an audience that included historians and period re-enactors in addition to regular participants eager to learn more about life in the time period. The McBrides not only described the physical features and artifacts of fort site explorations and excavations, but

demonstrated their considerable professional expertise by providing the historical background studies and records that aided their searches and assisted in interpreting the significance of their findings.



"Scratch 'em and Sue 'em: Post Civil War Legal Issues" Discussed by Dr. Bailey

On November 13, 2012, Dr. Kenneth

R. Bailey discussed "Scratch 'em and Sue 'em: Post Civil War Legal Issues" at the monthly Archives and History First Tuesday lecture, moved to the second Tuesday in November due to Election Day. "Scratch 'em" refers to removing, or scratching, the names of Civil War pension applicants from the list of those with proven Union service who were eligible to receive federal pensions. The denied applicants were then often sued for their actions against civilians and other alleged wrong-doings. Dr. Bailey outlined the legal issues that arose after the end of the Civil War, including a law suit to determine the official end date itself.

WVU Basketball Team Followed Championship with Military Service

Patricia Richards McClure, an Archives and History volunteer who writes veterans' biographies for the West Virginia Veterans Memorial Archive, began to see connections between several veterans as she researched their background stories. She found that they had been players and staff for the West Virginia University

basketball team that won the 1942 National Invitational Tournament championship, the pre-NCAA tournament that determined the national champion in its day. McClure discussed her findings and in "The 1942 WVU NIT-Championship Basketball Team: A Tale for Veterans' Day" at the November 15, 2012, Genealogy Club presentation, explaining each man's role on the team and his subsequent military service in World War II.

Archives and History Historian Greg Carroll Retires

Greg Carroll, a historian who has worked at the Archives for 23 years, retired at the end of the day on October 31, 2012. He was responsible for Civil War, Native American and African American research inquiries, and the handling of the West Virginia Union Civil War Medal program that distributes unclaimed medals to qualified descendants of the original veterans. Carroll will continue to give presentations occasionally at the Archives and History evening lecture programs, and will no doubt turn up on the newsletter calendar as a speaker for non-Archives programs in West Virginia. Mary Johnson, also an Archives historian and unofficial

staff photographer, caught Greg on his last day as he finished packing up his office. We hope he keeps his phone charged—we'll be calling for research advice and book purchase suggestions!

Western Virginia in *The Encyclopaedia of Geography*

In our August 2012 issue we published an excerpt from *The Encyclopaedia of Geography: comprising a complete description of the earth, physical, statistical, civil, and political; exhibiting its relation to the heavenly bodies, its physical structure, the natural history of each country, and the industry, commerce, political institutions, and civil and social state of all nations*, by Hugh Murray, F.R.S.E., published in three volumes. The first edition was published in 1837. The Archives and History Library's copy is an edition that was revised, with additions, by Thomas G. Bradford, and published in 1840. Following are more excerpts from the section on the Commonwealth of Virginia, focusing on the western portion of the state that in 1863 became the State of West Virginia, as found in Volume III, pages 518-528.

"The rivers of the western
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section all reach the Ohio. The Monongahela, one of the main constituents of the Ohio, is formed in Virginia, by the junction of the West Branch and Tygart's Valley River, and beyond the Pennsylvania line it receives the Cheat River, which descends from Greenbrier Mountain; this stream is navigable by boats for some distance, but the other branches are broken by falls. Little Kanawha rises in the same district with the West Branch of the Monongahela, but the other branches are broken by falls. Little Kanawha rises in the same district with the West Branch of the Monongahela, but its navigation is obstructed by falls. The Great Kanawha, the principal river of western Virginia, rises in the Blue Ridge in North Carolina, and bears the name of the New River until it unites with Gauley River. The Greenbrier, above the latter, and Elk and Coal Rivers below it, are its chief tributaries; steam-boats go up to Charleston, 60 miles. The Guyandotte and Big Sandy enter the Ohio below the Kanawha"

"The State is divided into 115 counties, comprising the two cities of Richmond and Wheeling, the borough of Norfolk, and the towns of Portsmouth, Williamsburg, Petersburg, Fredericksburg, Charlottesville, Lynchburg, Lexington, Fincastle, Urbanna, &c. Of the counties, 36 are in the Tidewater Section, 30 in the Middle, 17 in the Great Valley, and 32 in the Trans-Alleghany Section. It is to be observed, that the country drained by the New River, though physically belonging to the Valley, is politically connected with the Western Section, in the statements which follow in regard to population and divisions." [Charts with population per county given as "Total" and "Slaves" not included in these excerpts.]

The following counties, later to be included in West Virginia, are in the "Great Valley Section" list: Berkely [sic], Hampshire, Hardy and Jefferson (4 out of 17). These counties are in the "Western, or Trans-Alleghany Section" list: Brooke, Braxton, Cabell, Fayette, Floyd, Greenbrier, Harrison Jackson, Kanhawa [sic], Lewis, Logan, Marshall, Mason, Monongalia, Monroe, Nicholas, Ohio, Pocahontas, Preston, Randolph, Tyler, and Wood (22 out of 32).

The following sections quote *Report of the Geological Reconnoissance [sic] of the State of Virginia*, made under the appointment of the Board of Public Works, by William Barton Rodgers, 1836.

"The Great Valley Section consists of an elevated table-land between the Blue Ridge and the Alleghany chain, from 1200 to 1500 feet above the sea. It is, however, traverse by several mountain chains, forming numerous subordinate valleys, at once fertile and picturesque, and constituting a region of singular wildness and beauty. Its [sic] rare combination of great agricultural resources with extraordinary mineral riches, must one day render it the seat of a populous and wealthy community. At the lower end of the valley stands the town of Harper's Ferry, celebrated for the majestic scenery in its vicinity, which has already been described. The town has a population of about 2000 inhabitants, and contains three churches, two academies, several large flour and saw-mills, an Arsenal of the United States, containing about 80,000 stands of arms, and an Armoury for the manufacture of firearms. . . To the north is the thriving and busy little village of Martinsburg, with 1600 inhabitants. It contains two flour-mills, a brass and iron-foundry,

a woolen-manufactory, tanneries, &c. The northwestern counties of the Valley contain no considerable towns, but they are remarkable for their luxuriant river-bottoms, their treasures of coal and iron, and for the bold and grand features of the scenery." (p. 526-27)

"The southwest corner of the State is a wild, broken, mountainous tract, interspersed with fine valleys, and richly stored with mineral treasures, including salt, coal, lead, iron, copper, gypsum, limestone, and valuable medicinal springs." (p. 527-28)

"Passing down the valley of the New River, whose foaming and broken torrent and abrupt, towering cliffs present many scenes of wild grandeur, we enter the green meadows and cultivate fields of the Great Kanawha. Charleston, the principal town of this region, is a small village with about 1000 inhabitants, situated in the midst of the great salt-works of the Kanawha. Guyandotte, at the mouth of the river of the same name, is a noted landing-place for travelers from the western waters to the eastern States. Clarksburg and Morgantown are thriving villages on the Monongahela. Wellsburg, on the Ohio surrounded by rich beds of coal, is the seat of considerable trade and manufacturing industry; here are several large four and saw-mills, three flint and cut-glass works, several cotton and woolen-mills, salt-works, &c., and about 40,000 barrels of flour are annually shipped from the town. Population, 1500." (p. 528)
